

Quek Ling Kiong is the first Principal Conductor of the Singapore Chinese Orchestra (SCO) to have been born and bred in Singapore. Hailed as the "People's Conductor", he joined the SCO in 1997 as Percussion Principal after graduating from the Shanghai Conservatory of Music. He pursued conducting studies at Zurich University of the Arts, and was promoted to Principal Conductor in 2023 after two decades of conducting the SCO.

Besides leading one of the world's top Chinese orchestras, Quek has guest-conducted esteemed ensembles such as the Shanghai Chinese Orchestra, Guangdong Chinese Orchestra, Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, as well as European symphony orchestras. He is also the Music Director of the Singapore National Youth Chinese Orchestra; former Principal Guest Conductor of Singapore's Ding Yi Music Company (2016-2022); and Artistic Director of Singapore and Hong Kong's largest inclusive orchestras, The Purple Symphony and True Colors Symphony respectively.

Quek's accolades include the Singapore National Arts Council's (NAC) prestigious Young Artist Award (2002), NAC Cultural Fellowship (2013), and the Meritorious Award by the Composers and Authors Society of Singapore (2016). The Quek Ling Kiong Arts and Culture Scholarship was also established at the Singapore Management University in his honour.

A Musical Adventure

Composed by Tan Kah Yong

Originally written as the theme music for the Ministry of Education (MOE) Chinese Orchestra Music Camp 2009, A Musical Adventure depicts the composer's ongoing journey of music education. Beginning with a magical atmosphere, each musical note, chord, and harmony came as a magical discovery for the composer. Despite the mounting difficulties in his music lessons, the composer persevered through persistence and determination, ultimately overcoming these challenges. The piece deliberately ends with a minor 9th chord, denoting that music education is a continuous and never-ending process.

Chinese Music Classics

Dance of the Golden Snake

Composed by Nie Er, Rearranged by Xu Jing Xin

Based on the folk music "Dao Da Ban", Dance of the Golden Snake was composed by Nie Er in 1934. Depicting the energetic scene of dragon boat races during the Dumpling Festival, its melody brims with excitement and vigor, creating an especially festive atmosphere.

Dance of the Yao Tribe

Composed by Mao Yuan and Liu Tie Shan, Orchestrated by Peng Xiuwen

Rearranged in the 1970s for Chinese orchestra, this piece draws inspiration from the traditional festival music of the Yao tribe. It has since been regarded as a quintessential Chinese music classic, inspiring compositions all around the world.

Horse Racing

Composed by Huang Haihuai, Arranged by Qu Chunquan

Bringing to mind images of horses galloping in a racing competition, this classic is heavily influenced by Mongolian music, showcasing the Mongols' passion for horse racing and the boundless grasslands. The piece is fiery and features an energetic tempo from start to end, delighting audiences with its many rapid-fire passages.

Nocturnal Peace

Composed by Liu Tianhua, Rearranged by Yan Huichang

Originally titled Song of New Year's Eve, Nocturnal Peace was composed by the late maestro Liu Tianhua in 1928. As he made merry with friends and students during the Chinese New Year's Eve's festivities, it was said a sudden rush of inspiration overcame Liu, giving rise to this short improvisation. With its gently undulating melody and soft dynamic, the piece radiates a calming and joyous ambience, reminding us of how we should treasure our precious moments in life.

Geylang Sipaku Geylang



A well-known Malay folk song from Singapore, Geylang Sipaku Geylang is named after Geylang, a historic and culturally rich district. Written in the traditional Malay pantun style, its lyrics are playful and catchy, describing various scenes of daily life and festivities.

Rasa Sayang

Translating to "Loving Feelings", Rasa Sayang is a popular Malay song in the Malay Archipelago. Reflecting themes of love, nature, and communal harmony, the song is well loved for its catchy melody and heartful lyrics.

Singai Naadu


Composed by Shabir Sulthan, Adapted by Wang Chenwei

"Singai" is Tamil for "lion", while "Naadu" means "country", referring to the Lion City – Singapore. Composed by local singer songwriter Shabir Sulthan, Singai Naadu was first showcased at the 2012 National Day Parade, and has since become a yearly staple for our National Day celebrations. Featuring elements from Indian music, Wang Chenwei not only uses gliding notes on Chinese instruments to imitate Shabir's singing voice, solos by the Dadi and the Zhongyin Suona are incorporated to emulate the Bansuri (Indian flute) and Nadaswaram (South Indian Suona) as well.

Munnaeru Vaalibaa

Composed by S. Jesudassan, Rearranged by Liong Kit Yeng

Translating to "March Forward, Youth" in English, Munnaeru Vaalibaa is a timeless and popular Tamil song in Singapore. With a motivational and patriotic message, the song aims to inspire youths to strive for progress and success, overcoming challenges with courage and hard work.

Havana

Composed by Camila Cabello, Arranged by Sulwyn Lok

Havana is a song recorded by Cuban-American singer Camila Cabello featuring fellow American rapper Young Thug. Released on 3 Aug 2017, from her solo debut album, Camila, it is a salsa-inspired mid-tempo pop and Latin song with R&B-pop beats. Written in the key of G minor, Cabello sings the chorus over Latin-influenced piano riffs and rhythm, with her vocals spanning from the low note of G3 to the high note of D5.

Just the Way You Are

Composed by Bruno Mars, Arranged by Ng Chee Yao

Released on 20 July 2010, this pop and R&B song remains as American singer-songwriter Bruno Mars's greatest hit. The pop, R&B and soft rock ballad peaked at number 1 on the US Billboard Hot 100 and has sold over 13.7 million copies worldwide. Its instrumentation features the piano with a "hip-hop breakbeat", creating an easy listening, smooth ballad. The song is in the key of F major, with Mars's vocal range spanning from F3 to C5.



A marked departure from the boisterous nature of past National Day Parade songs, its melodies and lyrics emanate a wistful air of homesickness, tugging at the heartstrings of the common folk. It has since become an evergreen favourite, cementing its position as part of Singapore's cultural identity.
